Student Selection

During the lockdown we planned for a pre-gap year program that we hoped to start as soon as the lockdown was lifted and when it was, we began to physically prepare and get mobilization done for the pre-gap year to take place. Herbert and Prossy were very instrumental in the mobilization for the pre-gap year. They attended community gatherings of social groupings in order to introduce SAY and our programs. From these groups we were able to get recommendations for youths that could be fit for the programs.

The biggest highlight has been the selection of our new team of youths. The selection process lasted for a period of four days, we started off with 28 very enthusiastic youths that were eager to learn. Many of them had skills in mind that they would love to learn and grow in, some of the common skills mentioned were tailoring, hairdressing and mechanics

During the selections we were looking out for a couple of qualities in our youths and among these we looked for leadership qualities, involvement in the community, ability to follow instructions, team work, desire to learn.

To Look for these qualities, we had a couple of activities done and groups made. We introduced ourselves as SAY and gave the youths rules and regulations to follow, this was aimed at testing their listening skills. We had solution/problem solving scenarios/ stories and the youths had to solve the problems and this was testing their problem solving skills. We had a scavenger hunt in teams and this was to test their time keeping and teamwork skills, we had a lot more activities to test the different skills.

At the end of the week we were able to select a total of 11 youths. Our desire was to have 12-15 youths therefore we are still in the process of sourcing for the final few.

Land Updates

The rain season brings quite a smile on our faces for another special reason. The water collection tank, a few months ago, we set up a rainwater harvesting system. The water was to be collected from roofs of all buildings on the land. And this water is then shared with the community. So with the recent rains, we have collected water in our 500ltr water tank and shared it with our community. Our community still continues to suffer with the inadequate water supply. Most get their water from a water spring that is about 2km away and the only bore hole in the center of the village broke down. Therefore, the water collected and shared with some of the community people has really been a great help. The chicken houses at the land are currently under preparations for the next batch of chickens. The houses are being disinfected and simple repairs happening as we await for the next batch. Our hope is that the next chicken batches will have our new youths heavily involved.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH PROJECTS

FOUNDATIONS FOR FARMING

Most of the projects are up and running, the only project that hasn't started is the one from church 7 at Steenbok. The reason for the delays was first the political unrest and that of a champion, the champion has other responsibilities and it is hard to continue with the project if there is no one to look after the garden. We joined the team in Zimbabwe Head Office, as well as representatives from other Africa countries (Tanzania, Ruanda, Uganda, Malawi) for three morning sessions via Zoom with Uganda, Tanzania, Ruanda, Zimbabwe and SA.

The team went to different churches and had members of AWANA, FFF, OSWW and Youth ministry with them. After the sessions our staff debriefed, prayed together, then shared a meal. Feedback from the team and the field was that it was indeed a time of introspection, learning how important these values are, what our part is in believing and living the values in our family, then in our churches and eventually in our nation.
